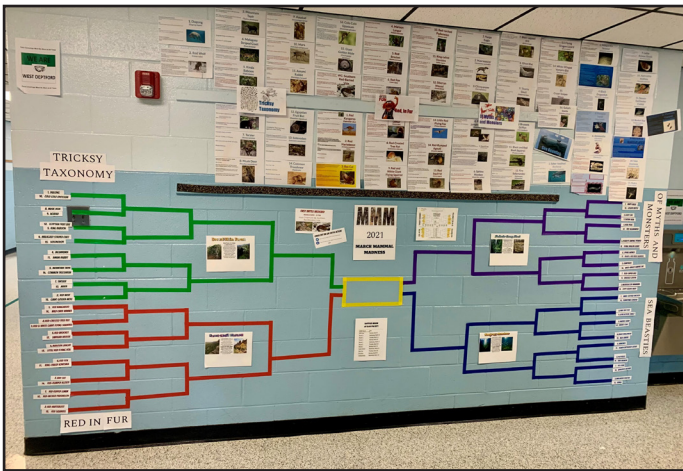


Holiday Cards for Local Seniors

In December, the WDMS Student Council launched a holiday card initiative, where students and community members created and/or signed holiday cards to bring joy to local seniors during a particularly isolating time. The Student Council received over 700 cards which provided holiday cards for every senior at three local assisted living facilities. The WDMS Student Council also assisted the WDHS Key Club in their food collection efforts to benefit this year’s Operation Blessing and their annual “Warm Their Feet” sock drive for the homeless.



Whether learning remotely or in person, WDMS students have been actively engaged in a variety of unique class projects. Our annual 5th grade Root Rally was completed earlier this spring. Students had to learn the meaning of 60 different roots, along with example words, and the spelling of the words containing a Latin, Greek, or Hebrew root. To test their knowledge, students were quizzed in an elimination style competition.

Oakview's Journey to Earn the "Promising Practice" Distinction

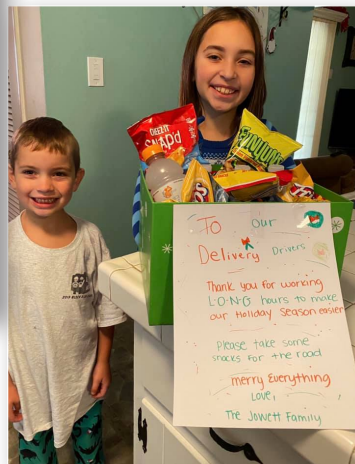
We are excited to share that Oakview Elementary School has embarked on a journey to earn the renowned "Promising Practice" distinction!

The Oakview Staff understands the value of the West Deptford School District's mission to develop well rounded, motivated, 21st century thinkers that will transition from competent students to productive and responsible citizens. In Oakview, we use innovative, successful initiatives to integrate character education into the curriculum. Character.org recognizes schools and other organizations for Promising Practices in character development. The Practice must be based on, or tied to, at least one of the 11 Principles. Throughout this school year, we have gathered and documented how we have implemented Character.org's Principle #5 ("The school provides students with opportunities for moral action") to apply for the "Promising Practice" award.

We feel we are soaring as a community! Through a variety of service-learning initiatives and activities that embrace a sense of belonging, the Oakview family continuously comes together to benefit the students, school, and community for the greater good. During the COVID-19 pandemic, our school community focused on making a direct impact on the needs of others. Throughout the month of December, our focused Character Trait was Generosity. We provided students, staff, and families with the opportuni-

ty to participate in Oakview's 'UnSelfie Project' to depict all the ways we are generous! The Oakview families completed selfless acts of kindness throughout the community and captured these acts in 'selfie' photos, which were posted on social media with the hashtag #UnSelfie. As a school community we demonstrated generosity when our staff created a school pantry to help alleviate the financial burden that the pandemic placed on community members that were out of work and struggling to provide for their family. We distributed food, toys, coats, blankets, and other items during the holiday season.

Through our service-learning projects, our students have a voice and choice regarding the impact they can make on their community. As our school community embraces generosity and community involvement, it unites local organizations to reciprocate such actions and model giving deeds for others. Our goal was to create school culture based on the philosophy that children need to be immersed in activities that build teamwork, celebrate responsibility, and identify and resolve community struggles. We believe that students learn best in hands-on situations where actions become meaningful through doing. Based upon this principle, Red Bank set forth on creating a



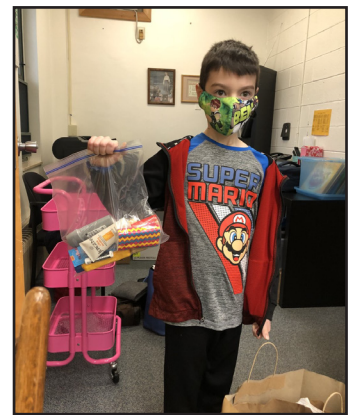
service learning project with the intention of it becoming an annual event; hence, the introduction of our "Caring Kits for Veterans" project.

The character trait for March is "responsibility," and what better way to help our young scholars develop this trait? This service learning project reflected the learning of new ideas regarding community service and was inclusive of preschool and second grade students. Students, families, teachers, and staff were asked to assemble kits that contained travel-sized self-care items to donate to the community. Some of these

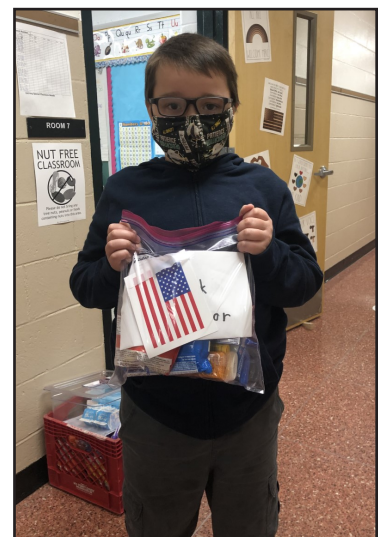


items included toothpaste, tooth brushes, deodorant, body wash, shampoo, moisturizer, lip balm, and a small individually wrapped snack.

Despite the challenge of the unusual learning environment, our families were able to donate and fill almost 200 kits. Teaching our students the value of selflessness and caring resulted in the overwhelming success of this project. Our students of all ages, backgrounds, and learning levels united as a team to give back to their community. It was necessary to adapt the project to reflect the obstacles faced during this school year. Next year, we are looking forward to when this project will bring school and families together for an evening of service learning and volunteering to help our students appreciate the character trait of responsibility.



Once all our Caring Kits were collected, a special thank you veterans note was added to each kit. The kits were loaded and delivered to the Veterans' Memorial Home in Vineland. The outpouring of gratitude from the veterans to our students was amazing. This project was a huge success and we are looking forward to next year. Pre-K Students Soar Towards Success

West Deptford Pre-K students are soaring towards success in Early Literacy! In addition to the Literacy skills embedded in the HighScope curriculum, the West Deptford Pre-K program also utilizes Foundations, a Pre-K Activities Set. The Foundations program supports our students' emerging understanding of the alphabetic principles of letter-sound associations and alphabetical order as well as the written language skill of manuscript letter formation. In the Foundations lessons this past Fall, our preschoolers met Baby Echo, a stuffed owl puppet used to help point to cards and pictures, and to help cue the students to repeat (echo) sounds. During daily interactive and multi-modality lessons, the students spent the first few months of school learning about letter-sound correspondence through large group direct instruction activities. With our shift into the second half of the program, our Pre-K students are working on further development of letter-sound relationships in a large group setting and are also practicing letter formation skills in small groups. With exposure throughout the year paired with literacy skills within the HighScope program, our students will be well equipped in Early Literacy skills for their Kindergarten year!

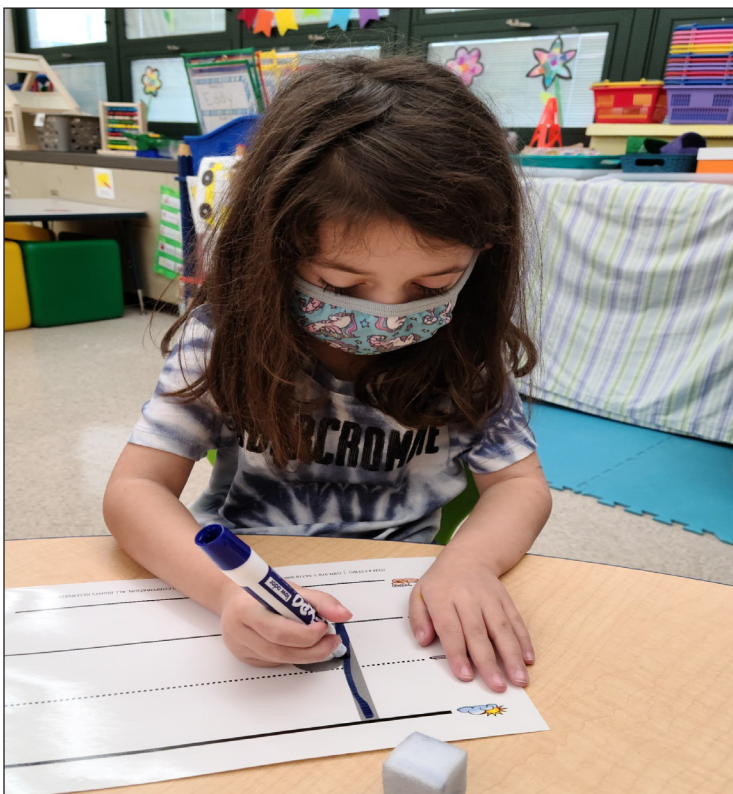

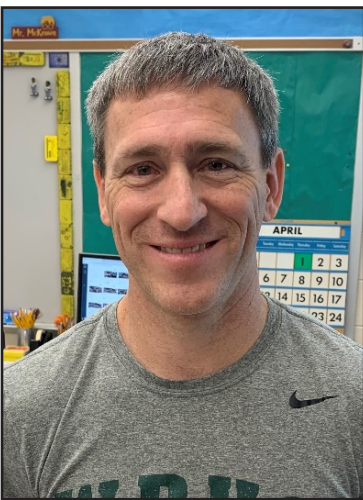

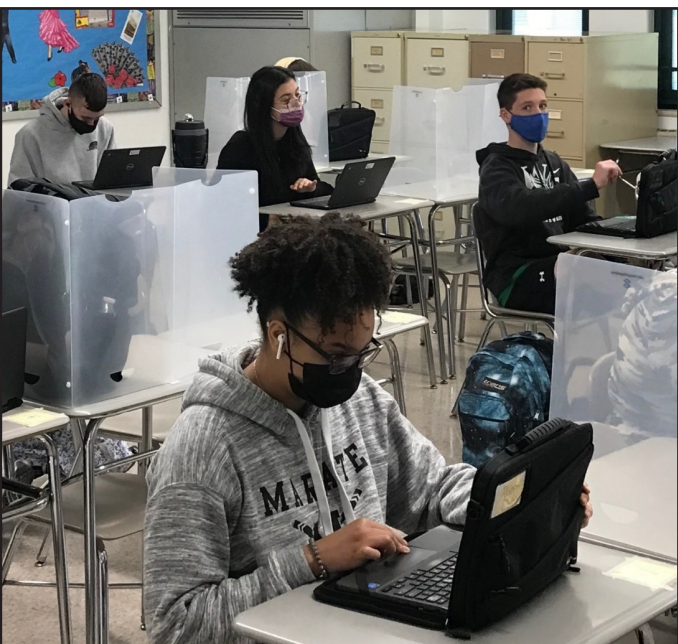


WDHS Students Return to School Full Time By Molly Doherty '21

Officer Scirrotto was a member of the West Deptford Township Police Department for 25 years. Now, he works as a SLEO (Special Law Enforcement Officer) for the West Deptford High School.

Over the course of the past seven years, Scirrotto was a detective in charge of Meagan's Law, Firearm applications, and the Alcoholic Beverage Commission, and felt that being a detective was "really fun." After retiring in December 2019, Scirrotto took some construction jobs in town and worked at RiverWinds Golf Course as a ranger during the spring and summer.

Now, Scirrotto starts his day at 6:45 a.m. as a SLEO officer at West Deptford High School. His main responsibility is the school's security, an important job in today's world. Scirrotto replaced Officer Michael Duffy who resigned this year.

Working as a SLEO officer is not an easy job. The officer is the first line of defense if an active shooter enters the school. Because of this threat, or any other serious threats, he or she carries the same weapons as a police officer. Some of the other responsibilities include checking the bathrooms to see if students are vaping and to address theft, bullying, fighting, and weapons as well as conduct drug searches. Fortunately, Scirrotto has never had to use his gun, "I have drawn my gun, but I never had to use it for defense," he stated.



Scirrotto has worked in the High School in the past. From 2001-2004, he worked as the District's Resource Officer. He handled any situation that needed a police officer's attention. Now, he handles issues that arise in the high school in conjunction with Officer Keinholtz, the School Resource Officer for the District.

Because of the COVID-19 Pandemic, a lot has changed in schools. Instead of 900 students squeezing past each other and rushing to their next class, there are now 88-150 students a day walking through the halls. Scirrotto has noticed the difference. "The school is not as busy and loud. There's not as much drama and instances," he said.

Since Scirrotto was a former student at West Deptford High School, he knows many of the teachers who have given him a warm welcome. Mr. Morrell was one of the administrators he knew because they worked with each other in youth sports. Other teachers he is friends with include Vince Layton, Ray Kirschner, and Mark Dixon. He also lived close to the principal of the high school, Dr. Brian Gismondi.

Scirrotto has dedicated his life to the Township. He spent his younger years in Green-Fields Elementary School and the West Deptford Middle School. In 1983, he graduated from West Deptford High School. Later, he coached youth sports for 30 years. He coached football, wrestling, baseball, and basketball. Scirrotto also participated in educational activities like serving on the Board of Education for four years.

A dedicated family man, Scirrotto has five children: Anthony, Derrick, Dominic, Vinny and Michaela. He also has five grandchildren. Four out five of his children have also graduated from West Deptford High School. Three of his grandchildren will go to West Deptford schools.

Scirrotto takes great pride in his new position: "I'm grateful for the opportunity to serve the students and staff of WDHS. It's my privilege to do everything in my power to keep the children safe."

2021 - 2022 School Budget Highlights



The West Deptford Board of Education approved a \$52,005,806 General Fund Budget on April 26, 2021. The 2021-2022 School Year Budget reflects a 1.5% tax levy increase. This amounts to an increase of about \$42 on every home at the average assessed value. West Deptford has the 4th lowest school tax rate of the 24 School Districts that are in Gloucester County.

In addition to maintaining all current programming, the District is hiring a new District Media Specialist. The Board of Education is making a significant investment to upgrade all school building security hardware including camera systems, access control systems, and burglar alarm panels. The budget also includes funding to begin the process of bringing West Deptford-owned buses back for the 2022-2023 school year for all local school routes.

SPECIAL EDUCATION PROGRAM

A wide variety of special education programs are available for students between the ages of 3 and 21 who require specialized instruction and/or related services such as speech/language services, occupational therapy and physical therapy in order to meet their educational needs. Educational program options include: instruction in a general education class with all the necessary and appropriate supports, supplemental instruction, resource center programs, special class programs within the school district, special education programs in out-of-district public or private schools, individual instruction at home, in medical institutions or other appropriate facilities.

PRESCHOOL DISABLED PROGRAM

The Preschool Disabled Program provides appropriate educational experiences for youngsters between the ages of 3 and 5 who experience developmental delays in the areas of speech and language, motor development, cognition and/or social/emotional functioning. The school district offers an educational program, related services, and curb-to-curb transportation at no cost to parents. The children are placed according to individual needs and developmental levels. In the preschool programs, they are encouraged to explore new materials, develop emerging skills, and interact in a social setting. Speech/language therapy and occupational therapy are offered as an integral part of the classroom program and/or on an individual basis as needed. If warranted, other services such as physical therapy may be initiated.
