## “Good Egg” Program Kicks Off at Red Bank

Each day our students enter the building ready to learn. They are learning to be readers, writers, mathematicians, scientists, historians, listeners, and speakers. Our teachers design instruction to engage their classes and pique their interest in all the content areas. However, equally as important are the lessons that teach our students the importance and value of good character. Respect, kindness, responsibility, compassion, friendship, are just a few of the character traits we work so hard to instill in every one of our students.

To help us reinforce positive character traits, Red Bank uses the “Good Egg” program. We want to catch our students being good citizens and celebrate their efforts to be kind classmates,

respectful students, and valuable members of our Red Bank School family. Students caught making good choices are presented with a Flight Ticket. Parents sign the Flight Tickets and the student hands it in to his/her teacher. We want parents to applaud their children’s good behavior in school. Each classroom has a collection box for the tickets. Every other Friday, tickets are collected for our lunchtime drawing. Tickets are pulled, and the lucky winners get a chance to spin the wheel. Some of the prizes they can win are a beanbag chair in class, wearing our good egg cape or sash, reading to a kindergarten class, lunch with Officer Jiles, or Treatz from Scheetz.

The big kick-off of the Good Egg program started with a special drawing for any students who saved the ticket given to them during the end-of-year kindergarten visits. The two winners of the special drawing were Zack Beidle and Alyssa Still. The Good Egg program officially began during the Week of Respect on October 2nd. Students were excited to start collecting their tickets for the chance to spin the wheel on Friday. Not only does the “Good Egg” program reward positive behavior, but also promotes meaningful interaction and communication between the Red Bank staff and students. Anyone can give out Flight Tickets, so the students

are always on task, never knowing where or when they can earn a ticket. They absolutely love the suspense and randomness of the Flight Tickets. Team Red Bank is on the path to good citizenship!



## Character Matters at Oakview



Oakview has placed an emphasis on boosting our Character Education Program and recognizing Students who are demonstrating positive behaviors. Our School Climate/ Safety Team has worked together to develop monthly character traits we expect all students to gain an understanding of and embody throughout the school year: caring, respect, citizenship, generosity, tolerance, trustworthiness, friendship, self-control, responsibility, and fairness.

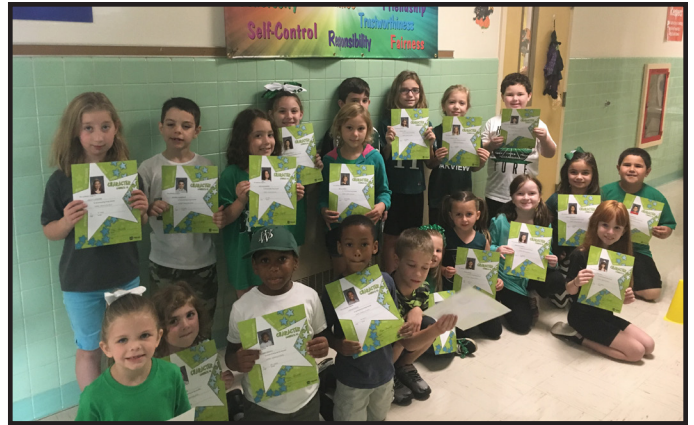
Our Guidance Counselor, Mrs. Durham, will be conducting classroom lessons to review what each trait means and provide students with background knowledge that will help them understand how they can be a student of character. During our Week of Respect, we had an assembly for all students to introduce them to the ten character traits that matter at Oakview, along with explaining how students can be rewarded for exemplifying such behaviors.

Each teacher will be selecting one student per month who best represents the specified character trait. These deserving students’ pictures will be displayed in our “Character Matters” hallway and will receive a certificate, along with a prize, to acknowledge their wonderful efforts in making a difference at Oakview. In addition, we will be implementing “bucket filler” tickets for students and staff to complete on behalf of another student. 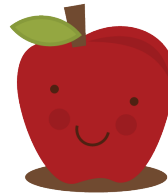

## Energy Savings Improvement Program

The West Deptford School District embarked on an Energy Savings Improvement Program (ESIP) to accomplish much needed improvements that complimented the projects completed in the District's referendum. The District Administration and Board of Education during the 2014-15 and 2015-16 school years leveraged the benefits of both a capital improvement referendum and an ESIP. Regulated and monitored by the New Jersey Board of Public Utilities, the District's ESIP completed the following capital improvements and sustainability initiatives that were budget neutral, had NO tax impact, and were cash flow positive:



- New LED Interior and Exterior Lighting – All Schools
- Lighting Sensors (Large Spaces) – All Schools
- HVAC Commissioning – All Schools
- Building Sealing of Doors, Windows, and Wall/Ceiling joints
- Solar Power Purchase Agreement (PPA) for 1.8 mega-watt array District-wide
- PPA Capital Funding for New Roofs at Green-Fields, Middle School, and High School
- Two 35KW Generators to secure continuous 24/7 power outage protection for District IT Servers and Phone System. One Generator at Middle School and One Generator at High School
- Walk-In cooler Upgrades at Red Bank School, Middle School, and High School
- Replaced Oakview School Chilled Water Pumps and installed new isolation valves on two new control valves
- New Energy Procurement Agreements securing much reduced electrical rates
- NJ Smart Start and PJM Rebates totaling \$105,000

The ESIP project was accomplished through an ESIP RFP process that selected Schneider Electric as the District's Energy Services Company (ESCO) who, in collaboration with the District Administration and Board of Education; designed, developed, and installed the project at their risk, not the District's. Additionally, the ESIP project will garner the district over \$330,000 in annual energy savings which will pay for the capital cost of the project while providing a net \$30,000 annual positive cash flow with a guarantee on all measured savings under Option A of the International Performance Measurement and Verification Protocol (IPMVP).

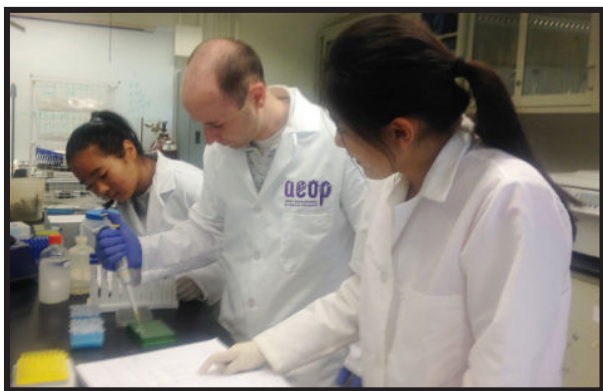

The Solar PPA program was accomplished through a PPA RFP process that selected National Energy Partners, LLC who, in collaboration with the District Administration, Board of Education, and Schneider Electric; designed, developed, and installed a combined 1.8 mega-watt of solar arrays at Green-Fields School, West Deptford Middle School, and West Deptford High School. The solar PPA allowed the District to successfully implement its sustainability initiative, install new roofs at the Green-Fields School, Middle School, and High School while incurring NO capital cost to the School District, reducing the District's carbon footprint and reliance on the power grid, and providing significantly reduced electrical cost.

Overall, the combination of the ESIP and PPA improvements have allowed the West Deptford School District to implement energy savings capital improvements and renewable initiatives that will serve the district well into the future while having NO capital cost impact on taxpayers.

On a related note, the Green-Fields Bucket Filler program has been recognized by Character.org as a National Promising Practice Award winner for 2017-18. As quoted in the press release, "we are extremely proud of this year's Promising Practices recipients. Their dedication to character development has proven over time to increase the well-being of so many students, their families and their communities across the United States and beyond. Validating character initiatives is at the core of what we do because it creates fertile conditions for multi-generational character growth where students and those in their lives thrive as ethical members of our society.
